#### 4.2 The governing board

- 4.2.f protects the institution from undue influence by external persons or bodies.  
(*External influence*)

#### **Compliance**

Numerous measures are in place to ensure the governing board is free from undue external influence. Board Policy BTRU 1.19 is cited as evidence of compliance. Board policy outlines the trustee's commitment and adherence to protecting the institution from undue influence by external persons or bodies. In addition, the Board Ethics Policy defines the responsibilities and expectations of Board members and describes their responsibilities. The Board Ethics Policy also stipulates that Board members are legally required to comply with the state of South Carolina's ethical rules of conduct found in Sections 8-13-700 to 8-13-795 of the South Carolina Ethics, Government Accountability and Campaign Reform Act of 1991. Board members are required to disclose potential conflicts of interest and to abstain from participating in any action that would affect a personal or familial economic interest (Section 8-13-700). Provisions in both state code and Board policy prescribe standards of conduct, state agency ethics, compensation, financial disclosure, and transparency preserve the appropriate institutional independence. Relevant training sessions are provided regarding these matters and the protocols protect the institution from external influence by established policies on conflict of interest, conflict of commitment, and standards of conduct.
