SACSCOC Reviewer Comments

Non-Compliance

The institution's response is in violation of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) policy, "Reports Submitted for SACSCOC Review," by including live links in its response and electronic documentation that is not consistently bookmarked, indexed, searchable, or readable.

The institution uses graduation rates, program reviews, retention, licensing exam success to demonstrate student success at the main campus. The institution also provided retention data for its regional campuses. However, the institution provided embedded tables as screenshots that were unreadable and directed the Off-Site Reaffirmation Committee to the Office of Institutional Research, Assessment, and Analytics (OIRRAA) website, and the Committee was unable to locate the specific information the institution expected the Committee to review. The institution used the six-year graduation rate as its measure of student success, but the source of this graduation rate is not specified. The institution stated that it supports at risk students by monitoring underrepresented minority students, Pell eligible students, first-generation students, and transfer students. The institution provided as an example the disaggregated data of underrepresented minority students but did not provide disaggregated data for the other populations mentioned by the institution that are monitored.

Campus Response

The Off-Site Reaffirmation Committee identified three primary non-compliance issues with Standard 8.1.

The first item was that the "The institution provided embedded tables as screenshots that were unreadable and directed the Off-Site Reaffirmation Committee to the OIRAA website and the Committee was unable to locate the specific information the institution expected the Committee to review."

For SACSCOC reporting the university has chosen to use the *National Student Clearinghouse Total Completion Rate method* for tracking its measure of student success. This method includes not only the six-year graduation rate, but also the rate that students graduate from other schools. Please see the most recent two years of reported data:

The third and final item that the Off-Site Reaffirmation Committee found as non-compliant was that "The institution provided as an example the disaggregate data of underrepresented minority students but did not provide disaggregated data for the other populations mentioned by the institution that are monitored.'

The Office of Institutional Research, Assessment and Analytics (OIRAA) has a dedicated "Student Outcomes" page on its website where constituents can retrieve information on such things as retention and graduation rates, placement rate data, licensure data and more. The university has made a concerted effort to support at risk students by monitoring performance and outcomes data in the form of retention and graduation rates for key groups such as underrepresented minority students, Pell eligible students, first-generation students, and transfer students. To demonstrate the level of commitment to proactive and coordinated student success monitoring and interventions, in January 2020, the university hired its first Assistant Vice President for Student Success, Dr. Silvia Patricia Rios Husain. One of the primary responsibilities of this new role is partnering with colleges, schools and departments to develop, monitor, and adjust student success plans and strategies for selected student populations, to include underrepresented minorities, first-generation students, low socioeconomic students, transfers, veterans, and other priority sub-populations based upon institutional retention and graduation data.
