I. Abstract

The primary mission of the University of South Carolina Columbia is the education of the state's diverse citizens through teaching, research, creative activity, and service. Founded in 1801, the USC system is the largest university in the state, serving more than 50,000 students from its flagship Columbia campus, three comprehensive campuses (Aiken, Beaufort, and Upstate), and four regional campuses (Lancaster, Salkehatchie, Sumter, and Union).

The University of South Carolina Sumter, a regional campus of the University of South Carolina Columbia, has as its mission to provide higher education and intellectual leadership to residents in its area. Its mission and vision statements were approved by the University's Board of Trustees in June 2016: https://www.sc.edu/about/system_and_campuses/sumter/about/mission_and_vision/in_dex.php

To better serve constituents in the adjacent communities in Lexington County, USC Sumter seeks the establishment of an educational site in Lexington, SC. The physical address of the site is 320 Corley Mill Road, Lexington, SC 29072.

Current course offerings at the site comprise less than 50% of courses applicable towards an associate degree, and SACSCOC was notified of this in May 2018 (Appendix C) per the rule for offering 25-49% of the program at the site – which the site will reached in Spring 2020. Instructional methods employed for these courses consist of traditional in-class, on-site, and online instruction, with USC-approved faculty members teaching the classes.

Population growth and demographic changes within the target population have led to a demonstrated demand for additional courses at the site. In order to be able to meet its mission of serving these students, USC Sumter is requesting to offer more than 50% of its Associate degrees at the River Bluff High School site (320 Corley Mill Road, Lexington, SC 29072).

II. Determination of the Need for Change/Relationship to Mission/Planning and Approvals for Change

A. Background

At the heart of this mission is a teaching faculty of high quality dedicated to excellence in instruction, scholarship, public and professional service, and creative

endeavor which enrich the classroom experience. USC Sumter offers a varied curriculum grounded in the liberal arts and focused on preparing students to continue their education in the University and throughout life.

The University of South Carolina Sumter recruits students prepared to succeed in completing a baccalaureate-level education. While the institution does not offer remedial instruction, it is nonetheless able to admit most students who apply due to the close working relationship between students and faculty. Enrollment varies with community need, but is expected to remain at approximately 1,300 students. The University of South Carolina Sumter was established to encourage higher education in the counties of Clarendon, Lee, Kershaw, Sumter, and Williamsburg. The original design of the institution incorporated a flexibility that has allowed changes in institutional capability with increasing educational demands of constituents.

The institution awards the Associate of Arts and Associate of Science degrees and provides for the completion of selected bachelor's degrees on campus through cooperative agreements and delivery structures with other USC System institutions. USC Sumter also provides general education and upper division coursework applicable to baccalaureate degree programs offered through colleges and universities nationwide. In addition to academic coursework, the mission of the campus includes non-credit courses, seminars, and workshops made available to the community for cultural enrichment and professional development.

The traditions of cultural diversity and freedom of thought are valued at USC Sumter. In a learning environment that develops respect for racial, geographical, intellectual, and economic diversity and an awareness of individual, societal, and global responsibilities, USC Sumter promotes courses, activities, and attitudes which influence the life of the mind in men and women and instill in them a thirst to continue learning throughout life.

USC Sumter emphasizes the development of the whole person and especially seeks to foster in students the disciplines essential to an educated citizenry. Core competencies, including the ability to communicate through effective writing and articulate speech; computational and quantitative mastery; creative and critical thinking; and the duties of citizenship are strategically integrated within the curriculum. Classroom experiences, student activities, and physical education programs also provide opportunities for cultural enrichment, leadership development, intellectual growth and interpersonal relationships, all contributing to a sense of self-reliance and a joy of learning.

B. Assessment of Need and Program Planning/Approval

South Carolina adults are, by and large, undereducated. According to recent statistics, only 20% of South Carolinians between the ages of 25-34 earn a bachelor's, graduate, or other professional degree, which is below the national average. https://statisticalatlas.com/state/South-Carolina/Educational-Attainment Lexington County's overall population grew by 13% from 2010 to 2019. During this same time span, the population of persons under 18 years of age grew by 13.8%. This growing population underscores the need for the site in Lexington County and is the primary reason for the request to offer more than 50% of courses required for an associate's degree at the River Bluff High School campus, which the site will reach Spring 2024.

Expansion of these course offerings will enable USC Sumter to offer more options for high performing students who are identified as eligible to enroll in college programs.

III. Description of Change – New Off-Campus Site

A. Courses

USC Sumter's academic program and its faculty are divided into four divisions:

- Arts and Letters
- Humanities, Social Science, and Education
- Math, Science, and Engineering
- Business Administration and Economics

Each academic division is led by a chair, elected by the faculty within that particular division for a four-year term.

Course offerings at the River Bluff High School site for Fall 2018 were determined between the Academic and Student Affairs officials of USC Sumter and administrators from the District Office of Lexington School District One. The schedule represents a pathway to complete an Associate of Arts (A.A.) degree, where much of the general education requirements necessary for eventual completion of a bachelor's degree at the University of South Carolina Columbia are included.

All courses scheduled for the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 Academic Years at the River Bluff site either meet specific requirements of the Carolina Core (the University of South Carolina Columbia's general education core for all baccalaureate degrees), or meet specific requirements for USC Sumter's associate's degrees (which include the Carolina Core). The 2021-2022 schedule of courses comprises 27 of the necessary 60 credit hours (47%) for the A.A. degree. Students completing these courses and continuing with the tentative 2022-2023 schedule would cross into the "50% of degree" mark.

Courses at this site will be offered during the Fall, Spring, and Summer semesters, and may vary slightly based on instructor availability. The intent at this time is to offer more courses required for an A.A. degree at the River Bluff High School site.

B. Admissions

To maximize the chances for student success in this program, admissions requirements for acceptance into the River Bluff dual enrollment program are higher than they are for tradition freshmen and transfer students at the USC Sumter campus. VI. Student Support Services

USC Sumter provides numerous student support services which will be extended to students choosing to enroll at the River Bluff site. The following lists the services and offers a brief description:

Admissions: Services provided by the USC Sumter Office of Admissions and Records are available to enrolled students at the River Bluff location. Admissions support services will be available on site at River Bluff High School as needed.

Academic Tutoring: All students have access to tutoring services through the Tutoring Center at Anderson Library. Sessions can be scheduled for face to face or online with flexible hours to accommodate students' schedules. USC Sumter also subscribes to the online tutoring service Brainfuse. Students gain access to the services in Brainfuse service through links on our website and through Blackboard.

Disability Services: Students at the River Bluff site will be served through our Disabilities Services Coordinator at USC Sumter. Registration for disability services takes place online here: <u>https://sawebdev.wufoo.com/forms/uofsc-sumter-palmetto-college/</u>

Accommodations are determined by the Office of Disability Services. Accommodations are approved on a case-by-case basis, and are governed by the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) and/or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Site visits to the River Bluff High School location for consultations will be scheduled as necessary and accommodations will be provided on site as deemed appropriate.

Financial Aid Counseling/Veterans Affairs: The USC Sumter Office of Financial Aid and Veterans Affairs will process and support students eligible for financial aid and other services (veteran and active duty) from the USC Sumter campus. Financial aid counseling and veteran support will be available on site at River Bluff as needed.

Personal Counseling: Personal Counseling will be available to students by River Bluff High School professional staff. Additionally, students can consult with the contracted personal counselor at USC Sumter by phone or in person at USC Sumter.

Careers and Internships/Jobs Page: USC Sumter maintains on its website resources for students as they near completion of their degrees and begin the transition to their professional careers. These resources include internship lists, a job vacancy listing, career exploration resources, resume samples, tips, and strategies.

Bookstore: The USC Sumter campus bookstore is located in the Student Union Building on the USC Sumter campus. Students at the River Bluff site may pre-order their textbooks through the bookstore website and books will be delivered to River Bluff High School for student pick up.

VII. Physical Resources

The River Bluff site is in an existing Lexington One School District high school with adequate physical resources to accommodate enrollments with room for growth.

The district has allocated a sufficient number of classrooms to accommodate the USC Sumter courses. Each classroom is equipped with state-of-the-art technology to facilitate instruction with minimal to no additional equipment requirements from USC Sumter.

Being that the program is occupying an existing educational facility, all basic infrastructure needs are met. Although no major equipment purchases are anticipated to get the program off the ground, small items may be obtained to support individual disciplines as the program evolves. Such small items might include laptop computers, printers, projectors, screens, document cameras, and consumable items such as dry erase markers, copy/printer paper, and other incidental office supplies. Small purchases will be absorbed into the proposed budget for this site and other existing campus budgets such as the IT budget. As enrollments and space requirements grow, unique needs such as supplies for art classes or science classes will be identified and added to the annual operating budget.

The River Bluff High School location will not have a substantive impact on existing programs and services.

VIII. Financial Support– (See Appendix E)

The financial sources for expanding from 25%-49% to more than 50% of the program are provided for directly from tuition funding. The projected revenue is based on the current High School Lottery Tuition Assistance Program rate of \$85/credit hour and anticipated student enrollment. Tuition revenues are expected to gradually increase as more students take advantage of the opportunity to complete more than 50% of the program at the River Bluff High School site. In the revenue projections, year one is expected to reach \$75,000. Program administration, faculty, and staff salary expenditures for year one are projected for \$62,000.

IX. Institutional Evaluation & Assessment Processes

Assessment of all academic courses is done through course evaluations, onsite observations, and through the University of South Carolina Columbia Assessment procedure. For courses which meet Carolina Core requirements, assessment is coordinated through the office of Palmetto College, which prepares an annual assessment report.

Course evaluations address topics such as quality of instruction, adequacy of facilities, adequacy of library resources, technology, and faculty availability (outside of class time).

Learning outcomes for students enrolled at USC Sumter who take courses at the River Bluff High School site are included in the annual assessment reports for all Associate degree programs.

Institutional Level Review Information

The University of South Carolina Columbia applies all appropriate SACSCOC standards and polices to its distance learning programs, branch campuses, and off-campus instructional sites. Policies and procedures in place at the University apply to all students regardless of how they access their courses; the University of South Carolina Columbia and the regional Palmetto College campuses apply all appropriate standards and policies to off-campus sites and distance education programs and courses, regardless of the modality.

SACSCOC Reaffirmation

At the SACSCOC Conference on December 7, 2021, the University of South Carolina Columbia's accreditation was reaffirmed. The University will receive an official letter from SACSCOC in mid-January 2022. The University's onsite visit was conducted virtually in March 2021 due to the pandemic; therefore, a verification visit will be planned for some time in 2022. The River Bluff High School site was included in the list of off-campus instructional sites offering 25-49% of a program at a site in the Institutional Summary Form (pg26) provided to the SACSCOC review teams.

The primary mission of the University of South Carolina Columbia is the education of the state's citizens through teaching, research, creative activity, and community engagement. Each of the regional Palmetto College campuses (Lancaster, Salkehatchie, Sumter, Union) also provide comprehensive, clear, and published mission statements that support the broader mission of Columbia. The primary mission of the regional campuses is to provide higher education and intellectual leadership to their service areas. The impact of each campus on higher education in South Carolina is specified by the region of the State served by each campus.

6.2a	Faculty Qualifications	The university applies the same policies and procedures, teaching qualification requirements, and record keeping standards to all instructors of record, regardless of the mode of delivery or location of the courses taught. Instructors of record for courses offered on the regional Palmetto College campuses, off-campus sites, and through distance education are held to the same standards as instructors-of-record teaching courses on the Columbia campus. The qualifications for all faculty are provided in the Faculty Roster.

Faculty appointment and faculty evaluation is held to the same standard and governed by the same university policies regardless of mode of delivery (i.e., distance education) or location of the program/courses with which the faculty member is affiliated. The regional Palmetto College campuses may employ policies and procedures outlined in their individual Faculty Manual, but these manuals are superseded by university-level policies to whom all campuses and locations must adhere.

7.1	Institutional Planning	In August 2019 upon the hiring of President Bob Caslen as the 29th President of the University of South Carolina, the President initiated a new and even broader approach to systematic, integrated, and system-wide planning and evaluation. The first phase of this comprehensive process involved an on- boarding review of the existing strategic plan and the structured method for annual planning, evaluation and assessment for each academic and service unit at the university system, including the Columbia campus and the regional Palmetto College campuses. As entities of the University of South Carolina system, accredited sites of University of South Carolina Columbia, and state agencies, as well as integral entities of their respective communities and service areas, the regional Palmetto College campuses actively participate in multiple, ongoing, integrated planning and evaluation efforts. The new strategic plan broadened the areas of important planning and evaluation for the entire university, including all locations and modes of delivery of courses/programs.
7.2	Quality Enhancement Plan	The QEP for this accreditation cycle has its overarching goal to ensure that all of students, regardless of location or mode of delivery of their courses/programs, engage beyond the classroom and reflect upon the learning resulting from that engagement. Student engagement has been shown to improve student success; from our own institutional data, the university has identified groups of students who engage at lower-than-expected rates and have lower graduate and retention rates. The focus of the QEP will be engaging students who fall into these groups, both on the Columbia campus, the regional

		Palmetto College campuses, and off-campus sites, regardless of modes of delivery.

The university has established policies and procedures governing the protection of student privacy for students who are enrolled in online/distance education courses through both the Columbia campus and the regional Palmetto College campuses. ACAF 2.03 outlines procedures apply to all courses and programs, regardless of location (Columbia, regional Palmetto College campus, or off-campus site), format, or mode of delivery.
10.9	Cooperative Academic Arrangements	The University of South Carolina maintains formal agreements between the parties involved in corsortial agreements, regardless of location of the program (Columbia, regional Palmetto College campus, or off- campus site) or the mode of delivery of the program/courses. The institution regularly evaluates such agreements. All consortial academic contracts and agreements are subject to the authority of the Board of Trustees.

		librarians. Each regional Palmetto College campus provides additional resources and instruction to students enrolled in programs on-campus, via distance education, through dual enrollment, or at off-campus sites affiliated with those campuses.

12.1	Academic and Student Support Services	Students are provided with academic and student support services at both the Columbia campus, regional Palmetto College campuses, and off-campus sites, regardless of the mode of delivery of the courses/program in which they are enrolled. While some services are available universally to all students, other services have been developed to service the specific student populations at their locations, including distance education and dual enrollment students. Students enrolled in distance education programs/courses or at off-campus sites through both the Columbia and regional Palmetto College campuses have the same level of access to offices that offer support services as other students. Students can contact offices directly, typically by phone or email, to receive immediate assistance.
12.2	Student Support Services Staff	The university hires qualified student support services staff to serve all students, regardless of location (Columbia campus, the regional Palmetto College campuses, or off-campus sites) mode of delivery of the courses or programs in which they are enrolled.
12.4	Student Complaints	Policies and procedures have been established and are adhered to in support of the efficient resolution and documentation of student complaints. Students at all regional Palmetto College campuses and off-campus sites are provided equal opportunity protections via the same university policies enforced on the Columbia campus. Students participating in distance education, as well as dual enrollment programs, are strongly encouraged to utilize the complaint processes in place on their respective campuses.
