## I. Abstract

The primary mission of the University of South Carolina is the education of the state's diverse citizens through teaching, research, creative activity and service. Founded in 1801, the USC system is the largest university in the state, serving more than 50,000 students from its flagship Columbia campus, three comprehensive campuses (Aiken, Beaufort, and Upstate), and four regional Palmetto College campuses (Lancaster, Salkehatchie, Sumter, and Union).

As the University of South Carolina's online degree completion consortium (undergraduate only), USC Palmetto College provides leadership, management, and coordination of online education across the USC system. Palmetto College students can begin and complete associate's and bachelor's degrees via asynchronous or real-time delivery. Palmetto College is also the administrative organization encompassing the four regional Palmetto College campuses, as well as USC Palmetto College Columbia (formerly known as Extended University).

Current course offerings at this site comprise less than 50% of courses applicable toward an associate's degree; SACSCOC received notification of this in April of 2019 (See Appendix C). To better serve constituents in Richland County and to provide quality educational opportunities to military personnel stationed at Fort Jackson, USC Palmetto College Columbia seeks the establishment of an educational site at the Fort Jackson Education Services Center, where it will offer more than 50% of the AA and AS degrees. The physical address of the site is 4600 Strom Thurmond Boulevard, Fort Jackson, SC 29207. The site will offer courses leading to the associate's in arts and associate's in science degrees.

USC Palmetto College Columbia offers instruction, courses, programs, and services designed for students who may not have access to one of the four regional Palmetto College campuses but who need courses at convenient sites, times, or in flexible formats compatible with work schedules and other obligations. This site will further the University's mission to provide the dissemination of knowledge, cultural enrichment, and an enhanced qualified of life among the diverse citizens of South Carolina.

# II. Determination of the Need for Change/Relationship to Mission/Planning and Approvals for Change

# A. Background

As the educational needs of South Carolina have changed and as the University of South Carolina has grown and expanded to meet those needs, USC Palmetto College Columbia has evolved in its mission to serve its constituent populations. From continuing education and credit programs to the USC evening program and adult education, USC Palmetto College (in its various incarnations over the past fifty years) has focused on serving non-traditional student populations, ensuring USC courses and credits are available, affordable, and accessible across South Carolina.

USC Palmetto College Columbia is currently responsible for oversight of both the BA in Liberal Studies and the BA in Organizational Leadership. Palmetto College Columbia also administers a transfer center in Lexington, SC, to provide area residents convenient access to USC's online completion program and coordinates the "University of Possibilities" program geared toward motivating middle-school students to consider college. Palmetto College is the administrative unit for the Palmetto Pathway, a bridge program designed to facilitate the educational goals of incoming Palmetto College freshman who reside on the USC Columbia campus. Students who complete 30 credit hours in the program during their freshman year and meet admissions requirements are eligible to enroll at USC Columbia as fully-admitted sophomores.

Located in the city of Columba, Fort Jackson is a 53,000-acre US Army Training Center. The Fort was established in 1917 as a part of the US efforts in World War I, and it became a permanent Army garrison in 1940. In 1973, it was appointed as a US Army Training Center. Today, Fort Jackson is the biggest and most active Initial Entry Training Center for the US Army, training 50% of all soldiers (and 60% of women soldiers) entering the Army each year. According to their website, more than 45,000 soldiers pass through Fort Jackson each year, in addition to 3,600 permanently assigned military personnel accompanied by approximately 10,000 family members. The Fort also employs almost 5,200 civilians.

The Fort Jackson Education Services Center seeks to provide courses and programs leading to undergraduate and graduate degrees. The US Army has demonstrated its commitment to providing high quality post-secondary education opportunities for military personnel through programs such as the Army Continuing Education System (ACES), which promotes lifelong learning, readiness and resilience through flexible and relevant educational programs, as well as GoArmyEd, which facilitates financial aid and tuition assistance.

For nearly a half century, the USC Fort Jackson program has been a leader in special programs offered to the military community (active-duty personnel, family members, DoD civilian employees, National Guard members and reservists, and veterans). Civilians, including local residents and USC Columbia-campus students, may enroll in courses on a space-available basis but are not eligible to earn an associate's degree.

Because of the transitory nature of many of the potential students at Fort Jackson, the number of awarded associate's degrees is anticipated to be relatively small, at least initially. The recent approval by the USC Board of Trustees and the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education for full-online delivery of selected baccalaureate degrees (e.g., Liberal Studies and Organizational Leadership) will enhance the availability of general education courses. It is expected that more students will qualify for and earn the associates degree while pursuing their baccalaureate degree in Liberal Studies and Organizational Leadership. There is a greater need to offer an expanded course selection at the Fort Jackson site to enable students to complete degree requirements in the face of re-deployment.

# B. Assessment of Need and Program Planning/Approval

South Carolina adults are undereducated compared to national averages. According to figures provided by Statistical Atlas.com<sup>1</sup>, only 25.1% of South Carolinians earn a bachelor's, graduate, or other professional degree, approximately 5% below the national average. Of the approximately 1.3 million US Armed Forces personnel serving in 2017, 869,066 (67%) had earned a high school diploma but had not earned a college degree of any type.<sup>2</sup>

Combined, these two figures indicate a great need for educational opportunities among military residents of South Carolina's Fort Jackson. Fort Jackson's 3600 permanently based military personnel and the nearly 10,000 dependents and other eligible persons would benefit from an associate's degree program. The establishment of the USC Palmetto College associate's degree programs at Fort Jackson is geared largely to a non-traditional audience, with courses offered on-site, online, and online-hybrid at times compatible with military personnel schedules

Several area-institutions, including Midlands Technical College, Claflin University, and Webster University, have already established presence on the Fort's campus. Claflin and Webster offer a limited number of bachelor's degrees. Midlands Tech offers associate degrees, many of which are specialized. USC's associate degrees cover most of the general education requirements (Carolina Core) for USC baccalaureate degrees and are transferrable to anywhere that accepts USC credit.

# III. Description of Change – New Off-Campus Site

# A. Courses

Course offerings at Fort Jackson are scheduled based on the assessment of the program director. The program director works with academic advisors to develop schedules that represents a pathway to the completion of an AA or AS degree. Courses at this site will be offered during the Fall, Spring, and Summer semesters, and may vary based on instructor availability. The intent is to offer all courses required for the AA/AS degree at Fort Jackson.

All courses scheduled for the 2019-2020 Academic Year at Fort Jackson meet either specific requirements of the associate degree or requirements of the Carolina Core (the general education component of all USC bachelor's degrees). The courses scheduled are:

As shown above, the 2019-2020 schedule of courses offers 29 of the necessary 60 credit hours (48.3%) for the AA and AS degrees. The tentative 2020-2021 schedule expands the course offerings to the "50% of degree" mark.

# **B.** Admissions

## C. Curriculum

Curriculum for the Associate's degree programs is governed by the Palmetto College Campuses Faculty Senate, subject to administrative approval of the University and appropriate State regulatory agencies.

The current curricula for the Associate in Arts and Associate in Science degrees was approved by the Palmetto College Campuses Faculty Senate in 2014 and is consistent for all USC campuses which award the degrees:

## 1. Associate of Arts

AND be able to demonstrate at least ONE of the following:

- Identify and analyze issues, develop logical and persuasive arguments, and communicate ideas clearly for a variety of audiences and purposes through speaking.
- Collect, manage and evaluate information using technology, and communicate findings.
- Examine different kinds of social and personal values, analyzing the ways in which these are manifested in communities as well as individual lives.

#### Degree Requirements

## Carolina Core (37-38 hours)

All course selections are from the approved Carolina Core Learning Outcomes list unless otherwise specified.

- CMW: Effective, Engaged and Persuasive Communication: Writing (6 Hours)
   Must be passed with a grade of C or higher
- ARP: Analytical Reasoning and Problem-Solving (3 Hours)
   Choose from MATH, CSCE, PHIL, STAT including MATH 111 or MATH 115
- SCI: Scientific Literacy (7-8 Hours)
   Must include at least 1 laboratory science course
- GFL: Global Citizenship and Multicultural Understanding: Foreign Language (0-3 Hours) One 3-hour language course at any level or score of "2" on placement exam
- GHS: Global Citizenship and Multicultural Understanding: Historical Thinking (3 Hours)
- GSS: Global Citizenship and Multicultural Understanding: Social Sciences (6 Hours)
- AIU: Aesthetic and Interpretive Understanding (6 Hours)

Choose ONE of the following three options:

- CMS: Effective, Engaged and Persuasive Communication: Speech (3 Hours)
- INF: Information Literacy (3 Hours)

VSR: Values, Ethics and Social Responsibility (3 Hours)

# Electives for A.A. Degrees (22-23 hours)

Electives may be any additional courses not used to fulfill the previously stated requirements. Students who intend to apply these credits toward a baccalaureate degree awarded by another campus or institution are advised to work closely with an academic advisor to choose electives that will meet preliminary requirements of the four-year major they wish to pursue. Of particular importance is completion of general education requirements. USC Columbia requires a minimum of 31 general education credit hours and a student planning to pursue a USC Columbia baccalaureate degree must complete these hours. These hours can be incorporated within the 60 hours required for an AA or AS degree when electives are carefully selected. Applying for an associate's degree does not in any manner affect eligibility to apply for a baccalaureate degree, and vice versa.

#### Other requirements:

In addition to the requirements for the A.A. and A.S. degrees stated above, the following stipulations also apply:

- Students must have a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or better (does not include course grades earned by challenge examinations).
- The final 15 semester hours must be earned at USC.
- No courses of a remedial, developmental, skill-acquiring, or vocational nature may apply as credit toward degrees.
- Pass-Fail option on elective courses is allowed.
- No more than 15 hours of nontraditional credits, which include DANTES, CLEP, and military experience.
- No more than 3 1-hour PEDU activity courses may count toward meeting Associate's degree requirements (any track).

- CMW: Effective, Engaged and Persuasive Communication: Writing (6 Hours)
   Must be passed with a grade of C or higher
- ARP: Analytical Reasoning and Problem-Solving (6 Hours)
   Choose from MATH, CSCE, PHIL, STAT including MATH 111 or MATH 115
- SCI: Scientific Literacy (8-12 Hours)
   Must include at least 2 laboratory science courses
- GFL: Global Citizenship and Multicultural Understanding: Foreign Language (0-3 Hours) One 3-hour language course at any level or score of "2" on placement exam
- GHS: Global Citizenship and Multicultural Understanding: Historical Thinking (3 Hours)
- GSS: Global Citizenship and Multicultural Understanding: Social Sciences (6 Hours)
- AIU: Aesthetic and Interpretive Understanding (3 Hours)

Choose ONE of the following three options:

- CMS: Effective, Engaged and Persuasive Communication: Speech (3 Hours)
- INF: Information Literacy (3 Hours)
- VSR: Values, Ethics and Social Responsibility (3 Hours)

# Electives for A.A. Degrees (18-22 hours)

Electives may be any additional courses not used to fulfill the previously stated requirements. Students who intend to apply these credits toward a baccalaureate degree awarded by another campus or institution are advised to work closely with an academic advisor to choose electives that will meet preliminary requirements of the four-year major they wish to pursue. Of particular importance is completion of general education requirements. USC Columbia requires a minimum of 31 general education credit hours and a student planning to pursue a USC Columbia baccalaureate degree must complete these hours. These hours can be incorporated within the 60 hours required for an AA or AS degree when electives are carefully selected. Applying for an associate's degree does not in any manner affect eligibility to apply for a baccalaureate degree, and vice versa.

#### Other requirements:

In addition to the requirements for the A.A. and A.S. degrees stated above, the following stipulations also apply:

- Students must have a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or better (does not include course grades earned by challenge examinations).
- The final 15 semester hours must be earned at USC.
- No courses of a remedial, developmental, skill-acquiring, or vocational nature may apply as credit toward degrees.
- Pass-Fail option on elective courses is allowed.
- No more than 15 hours of nontraditional credits, which include DANTES, CLEP, and military experience.
- No more than three 1-hour PEDU activity courses may count toward meeting Associate's degree requirements (any track).

## D. Oversight and Evaluation

Administrative oversight of the AA/AS program offered at the Fort Jackson Education Services Center will be provided by the designated Program Director, in conjunction with the Executive Director of Military Programs & Strategies and the Dean of Palmetto College Columbia

The program will be monitored through yearly assessment and evaluation of students and faculty. The process is described in detail in Section IX. Assessment results will be reviewed annually by the Dean of Palmetto College Columbia, the Executive Director of Military Programs and the Program Director, then reported to the Office of Institutional Research, Assessment, and Analytics.

# IV. Faculty Qualifications

USC Palmetto College Columbia currently employs approximately a dozen full-time faculty members qualified to teach in a variety of academic disciplines and approximately 20 adjunct faculty. This pool of faculty will support the academic courses offered at the Fort Jackson site. All instructors appear in the attached faculty roster (Appendix D) and meet the minimum teaching qualifications outlined in the University's policy governing faculty credentials, ACAF 1.20, Credential Verification for Instructors of Record.

# V. Library & Learning Resources

Students enrolling in either associate's degree program at Fort Jackson have full privileges and use of the Thomas Cooper Library, the primary library for all students at the University of South Carolina. Thomas Cooper houses seven levels of research materials, subject matter experts, and partner organizations to complement the students' learning experience. The Thomas Cooper Library is open 24 hours Sunday-Friday and from 8:00AM-midnight for students with a USC ID. All University of South Carolina students on the Fort Jackson campus are issued as USC ID.

Library services include books, iPads, lockers, group study spaces, interlibrary loan, scan and deliver, and free workshops.

The Thomas Cooper library building is 20 minutes from Fort Jackson (7.7 miles); however, the Library has numerous online resources available to students. Students are able to request materials from PASCAL and Interlibrary Loan, as well as place physical materials on hold. Students residing outside Richland and Lexington counties have access to the Book Delivery system and can request library materials mailed to their home address. Access to the library's holdings is easily accessible off-site, and the library catalog includes many e-books and e-book collections, including Oxford Reference Premium, AccessPharmacy, Sage Reference Online (Handbooks), and Gale Virtual Reference Library.

On base, military students also have access to the Thomas Lee Hall Library, located at 4679 Lee Road. Thomas Lee Hall Library's collection offers wide variety of books and access to thousands of downloadable audiobooks, eBooks and eVideo. There are 29 computers available for internet access, free Wi-Fi, copy/scanning services and daily printing.

For 24/7 homework and research assistance, the Thomas Lee Hall Library provides a large selection of searchable electronic databases filled with the most current encyclopedias, eBooks, newspapers, scholarly journals, magazines and more. All members of the Fort Jackson community, with valid military identification

cards, may check out materials. The Thomas Lee Hall library is open from 11:00AM-7:00PM Monday-Thursday, and from noon to 5:00PM on Friday and Saturday. The Library is closed on Sundays. https://www.basedirectory.com/fort-jackson-directory/library-thomas-lee-hall

Students are provided information on the use of library services by the Program Director upon their matriculation. In most cases, course instructors requiring the extensive use of library resources provide library instruction to their classes through scheduled class time.

# VI. Student Support Services

Prospective students visit the campus and gain information about the program. They apply through the UofSC Columbia admissions process and are then advised by a campus administer at Ft. Jackson.

Students will be assigned an advisor who will handle the completion of the program of study and ongoing advising each semester. Advising will take place via phone, email or video conference and will be based on student preference. After advising, students will need to sign and return a signed advisement form to their advisor. An administrative assistant in the department will clear students to enroll in classes. Graduation checks will be reviewed and approved by the Dean of Palmetto College Columbia.

# **Academic Integrity**

The Academic Integrity office promotes academic integrity, upholds the Honor Code, and supports the ideals set forth in the Carolinian Creed to foster a better living and learning environment in the University Community. Academic ethical behavior is essential for an institution dedicated to the promotion of knowledge and learning. The University of South Carolina is committed to fostering a university environment which exemplifies the values embodied in the Carolinian Creed. All members of the University Community have a responsibility to uphold and maintain the highest standards of integrity in study, research, instruction, and evaluation; as well as adhering to the Honor Code. An online tutorial is available to help students understand why academic integrity is important to our community and to navigate their obligations.

#### **Academic Success Initiatives**

Academic Success programs include course-specific support, assistance with study skills, and early intervention referrals. Course specific support includes supplemental instruction and tutoring, which provide high quality, peer guided, assistance to enhance learning and academic success. Supplemental instruction focuses on introductory courses that are critical to students' academic progression and is delivered by trained peer leaders in a group setting. Tutoring provides support for a wide range of courses and is delivered by trained peer leaders in 1:1, group, and online settings. Assistance with study skills is provided by success consultants who engage with individual students in one-on-one appointments to set goals, explore study and time management strategies, develop action plans, and make referrals to appropriate university resources. The early intervention referral program, Success Connect, facilitates outreach to students experiencing difficulties or challenges based on faculty referrals or student self-identification. Success consultants meet individually with referred students and assist them in accessing appropriate resources and support.

#### **Bookstore**

Barnes & Noble manages the official bookstore for the University of South Carolina. Students can pre-order their textbooks through the bookstore website.

#### **Disability Services**

The Office of Disability Services coordinates efforts to ensure that students with disabilities receive reasonable accommodations. They office also serves as consultants to faculty, staff, and campus partners. Students with disabilities must register with the Student Disability Resources Center before they can request accommodations. Accommodations for students with disabilities are approved on a case-by-case basis, and

are governed by the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) and/or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Accommodations available include (but are not limited to):

Students also have access to the assistive technology lab, which includes accessible workstations, specialized software and hardware, and technology support.

## **Counseling and Psychiatric Services**

Counseling and Psychiatric Services provides psychological counseling, psychiatry, education, and consultation, to the University community, as well as clinical supervision for selected mental health graduates. Our multi-disciplinary team offers services that promote social, emotional, physical, and cognitive well-being for people facing developmental or unplanned challenges.

# **Financial Aid and Scholarships**

The Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships supports the instructional and service missions of the University by removing financial barriers so that qualified students, both undergraduate and graduate, may attend the University. Financial aid staff provides assistance, education, and support for students and families in securing the funding they need to attend the University. They administer scholarships and financial aid programs in accordance with the mission of the University, and state and federal law. They also provide online tools to assist students with reviewing their aggregate borrowing history and estimating loan repayment (housed within Self Service Carolina) as well as information for managing education debt.

#### **Substance Abuse Prevention and Education**

The Substance Abuse Prevention and Education Office serves to educate students so that they can make informed decisions regarding substance-related behaviors and other student-wellness issues. Through collaboration with other service areas and departments on campus, SAPE provides programs, services, and resources that encourage Carolina students to recognize their decisions impact not only themselves, but also the greater University and City of Columbia communities. The SAPE Office advises a Peer Education Team and administers programs such as AlcoholEdu and Students Taking Initiative and Responsibility (STIR). SAPE also provides Carolina students with a Gamecock tailgate party before each home football game and provides presentations and information to various entities on campus to support responsible decision-making in the student development process.

# **Veterans Affairs and Military Services**

The University's Office of Veterans and Military Services is committed to helping students navigate the experience of balancing student and service life. The office assists students with questions, application, and connecting students to on-campus resources. Veterans, active duty service members, and reservists are also eligible for priority course registration. Undergraduate students serving on active duty, or members of the National Guard or reservists, qualify for tuition discounts and can apply via the Office of Veterans Affairs and Military Service. The office also assists veterans (and their dependents) who qualify for in-state tuition and fees (SC Code of Laws Section 59-112-50) verify their residency status.

The Office of Veterans and Military Services facilitates several student and alumni organizations, including the Student Veterans Association, the Veterans Alumni Council, and the Veterans Student Services Advisory Council. The Green Zone program — available for both students and faculty and staff members — trains participants to provide a safe space for veterans.

In addition to the resources of the University, the US Army provides academic support to students at the onbase Education Center, including counseling, information about financial aid, and enrollment processes in academic programs.

# VII. Physical Resources

The Fort Jackson Program is housed in the Fort Jackson Education Services Center (4600 Strom Thurmond Boulevard) with adequate physical resources to accommodate initial enrollments with room for growth.

The Center has allocated five classrooms for use by on-site courses offered by the University. Each classroom is equipped with sufficient technology to facilitate instruction with minimal to no additional equipment requirements. The computer laboratory is open between 7:30am-midnight, except when class is in session. Students also have access to 29 computers in the library, as well as two computers available in the Student Services Office.

The laboratory has four large rectangular tables that house three sinks at each table. There are two chairs located on both sides of the sink. Each table can accommodate six people, with a total room capacity of 24. There are end caps located at the end of each table that are used to house materials. Each student station has electrical outlets, faucets, and a sink. There are also small storage openings beneath each sink that can be used to house materials. The laboratory is also equipped with one chemical hood and one environmental chamber. Smaller equipment included hotplates and 25 compound microscopes. Safety equipment included in the laboratory is a safety shower with drain access on the floor, eyewash station, fire extinguisher, fire blanket, and a first aid station.

There are two large storage rooms inside the laboratory. Each storage has large doors that can be locked from the outside. The teacher's podium and desk are located at the front of the room. The lab is equipped with an overhead projector, one white board, and one projector screen that is installed into the ceiling. There is a switch on the front wall that allows the projector to go up and down.

Being that the program occupies an existing educational facility, all basic infrastructure needs are met. There are no immediate equipment needs, aside from replenishments for laboratory supplies and repairs or replacements to existing computers.

The Fort Jackson location will not have a substantive impact on existing programs and services.

# VIII. Financial Support

In the event that the required resources do not materialize, Palmetto College would re-evaluate its on-site course offerings at the Fort Jackson site and refocus its effort toward expanding distributed learning (e.g. online) course offerings to include a wider selection of courses needed to complete the AA and AS. These courses would be offered through the Columbia Campus of Palmetto College Columbia using existing faculty and administrative resources.

## IX. Institutional Evaluation & Assessment Processes

Assessment of all academic courses is done through course evaluations, on-site observations, and through the University of South Carolina Assessment procedure. Assessment for courses meeting the Carolina Core requirements is coordinated through the office of Palmetto College, which prepares an annual assessment report for the Office of the Institutional Research, Assessment, and Analytics.

Course evaluations address topics such as quality of instruction, adequacy of facilities, adequacy of library resources, technology, and faculty availability (outside of class time).

Learning outcomes for students enrolled in courses at the Fort Jackson site are included in the annual assessment reports for all associate's degree programs.

Faculty teaching courses in the associate's degree programs are reviewed and evaluated annually through an administrative process. Full-time faculty teaching in the program are also peer reviewed on a regular schedule, as dictated by pages 14-16 in the 2019 edition of the Palmetto College Campuses Faculty Manual. The Manual also includes information regarding terms of employment, teaching responsibility, and definitions of effective performance of duties.



Please be aware, when the institution begins to offer 50% or more of the credit for at least one program at an off-campus instructional site, a prospectus for approval of the site should be submitted **prior** to reaching the 50% threshold at the site. As a reminder, the 50% threshold requiring approval applies to any program offered by the institution; i.e., certificate, diploma, and degree programs. The due dates for submission of a prospectus are:

- January 1 for sites reaching the 50% threshold as of July 1 of the current year or
- July 1 for sites reaching the 50% threshold as of January 1 of the following year.


