Thank you for your letter of May 15, 2014, transmitting a prospectus for the offering of 50% or more of programs at a previously unapproved off-campus site.

The location of the site is as follows:

USC Union Laurens Site 507 North Harper Street Suite L Laurens, SC 29360

The Laurens site of the University of South Carolina Union began offering classes in 1983, and in 2002, moved to the Laurens County Higher Education Center at 663 Medical Ridge Road, Clinton, SC 29325. No notification of that location could be found in the Commission's records. In January 2014, USC Union relocated its Laurens site to the above address in Laurens, SC. The site is consistent with the mission of the University and its site in Union, SC, to meet the educational needs of students in that location. Since the relocation, an increase in credit hours taught at the site and the demand for more courses indicate a need for the site.

Courses are offered at the site in liberal arts, computer science, organizational leadership, and business. An audit performed in 2012, indicated that some Union students were completing more than 50% of the credits required in associate degree programs. However, no approval was sought for the site at that time. The prospectus included a letter from the Commission dated February 2, 2012, stating that the institution's accreditation "includes extended program sites wherever located (including Lancaster, Salkehatchie, Sumter, and Union)." However, the site now in Laurens was never reported or approved to offer 50% or more of a program and thus it was not visited during the University's reaffirmation activities in 2011.

Admission policies for the Laurens site are the same as for students at the Union Campus. Currently a variety of courses is offered to predominantly non-traditional students and those courses can count toward several different degree programs which were not listed. The prospectus notes that only courses, not programs, are offered at the site but that 50% or more of credits required in programs can be earned. Please identify the programs for which students may earn 50% or more of the credits. Course descriptions for courses taught in fall 2011, spring 2012, and fall 2012, were provided. Please provide information concerning courses to be taught fall 2014.



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The attached program proposal to the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education states that "this program will be delivered through live, face-to-face classes; two-way video streaming classes; and occasional online classes." However no information was provided concerning resources at the site which would allow for two-way video streaming classes or online classes. **Please provide information concerning the instructional methodologies used at the site.**

Administrative oversight and responsibility for the off-campus site was not explained. Please provide information concerning who provides oversight for the site. USC Union full-time and part-time faculty members teach all courses at the Laurens site. A roster was included for fall 2012, spring 2013, and fall 2013. While the following faculty members may be qualified to teach the courses assigned to them, those qualifications are not clear, and the institution should provide additional explanatory information documenting their qualifications:

- 1. Thomas Bishop: Teaches MUSC 129 (University Chorus) and holds the B.A. in Music Education. No additional qualifications were provided.
- 2. Stephen Buchanan: Teaches PEDU 121 (Beginning Tennis) and holds the M.A. in Psychology. No additional qualifications were provided.
- 3. Ter Buritica De Mayon: Teaches SPAN 109 (Beginning Spanish I) and SPAN 122 (Basic Proficiency/SPAN) and holds the J.D. degree. Experience as a tutor and teaching would not provide evidence of qualifications.
- 4. Michael Greer: Teaches POLI 201 (American National Government) and holds the M.P.A. degree. Qualifications are not clear.
- 5. Neill Hance: Teaches SPCH 140 (Public Communication) and holds the M.F.A. in Drama. The notation that he has past experience teaching public speaking courses would not be evidence of qualifications to teach the course.
- 6. Jessica Holland-Davis: Teaches BIOL 232L (Anatomy Laboratory) and holds the B.A. in Experimental Psychology. Qualifications are not clear.
- 7. Roy Redman: Teaches ACCT 225 (Intro to Financial Accounting) and holds the M.B.A. in Management. Only three graduate hours earned in ACCTG 101 (Managerial Accounting) was listed.
- 8. Charles Sublett: Teaches POLI 201 (American National Government) and holds the M.A. in History. Only two of the graduate courses listed as taken would appear to relate to the course assigned.
- 9. William Taylor: Teaches CSCE 101 (Intro Computer Concepts) and RCAM 151 (Computer Literacy and Application) and holds the M.B.A. No additional information was provided.
- 10. Susan Corley: Teaches HIST 111-112 (U.S. History) and holds the M.Ed. in Secondary Education. Only two graduate courses taken in U.S. History were listed.



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Please consult Comprehensive Standard 3.7.1 which requires that the institution document the qualifications of faculty members to teach the courses assigned to them. These qualifications may include such things as academic preparation, professional experiences, research, and publications but they must be specified and related to the courses assigned. If a faculty member has earned graduate credits that relate to the course(s) assigned but the credits would not be readily apparent from the degree earned, the graduate courses and credits should be listed and the relationship to the assigned courses should be clear. The institution must make its case that the number and nature of the graduate credits are sufficient to qualify the faculty member to teach the courses assigned.

Learning resources at the Union campus are available to students at the site as well as all collections throughout the University of South Carolina System through interlibrary loan and the librarian at the Laurens Learning Resources Center assists students in accessing resources. Collections on site at the USC Union campus are supplemented by electronic books and audio-visual materials. Databases are available as well. While the prospectus notes that courses, not programs, are offered at the site, students can earn 50% or more of programs. Discipline-specific learning resources to support the courses offered at the site should be listed.

Student support services at the USC Union campus were described but how students at the Laurens site can access specific support services was not explained. Please provide specific information concerning the student support services which are available to students at the Laurens site along with information concerning how those students may access the services.

The Laurens location consists of 3,000 square feet of space to include three classrooms, offices, a lobby, a break room, and a library which is listed as having three computers for student use. **Please provide evidence of adequate physical resources to accommodate learning resource provision for students at the Laurens site.** One of the classrooms apparently contains fifteen desktops and serves as a computer lab but only when the classroom is not used for classes. Information concerning adequacy of financial support included reference to "upfitting costs" of the site including new table and chairs for classrooms and smart room equipment for one classroom as well as library shelving. **Please provide evidence that physical facilities at the site are adequate to support the offerings at the site.**

We defer action concerning the Laurens off-campus site pending review of the above requested information.

Because 50% of a degree program has been offered at an unapproved off-campus site, the College is in apparent non-compliance with Comprehensive Standard 3.12.1. Please submit to my office by April 8, 2015, four copies of the policy and procedure document the institution has developed to ensure timely reporting of substantive change in the future. Please submit the four copies under a separate cover letter. Do not include them with other substantive change submissions. The document will be forwarded to the SACSCOC Board of Trustees for review at its June 2015 meeting. In developing the documents, please consult Best Practices for Developing Policy and Procedures Documents, published on our website under the Policies and Publications button.

Please provide information concerning the instructional methodologies used at the site.

The three classrooms at the Laurens location have new tables and chairs on rollers designed for the adult learner. In all classrooms, faculty members have a high-tech podium and an elevated chair in order to control the sophisticated technology. With a desktop computer on the podium, faculty can project PowerPoint presentations, access the internet, and show information on a large screen.

Two of the classrooms are equipped with video-streaming technology to deliver courses between the Union and Laurens sites. These technologies enable faculty members in Union or Laurens to teach students at the other site. Transmissions use live, two-way video and audio. Cameras are located in two classrooms at both locations, and if students are enrolled in a class at both sites, they can interact as well. Microphones at the instructor station and at student tables enable audio communication to accompany the video transmission. Thus, a faculty member in Union can teach students in Laurens interactively. The equipment also enables the transmission of computer desktop images (for PowerPoint presentations, online videos, or other content), VHS, and DVD content with little or limited lag.

The third classroom at the Laurens location does not have video-streaming technology, but does have 13 desktops with the capacity for 17, so that it can function as a computer lab when not in use for a class.

Support for online classes is offered at the Laurens location via the computer lab classroom and three library computers. Students are welcome to use any available computer in these spaces to conduct their classwork in an online course. This is important for students who do not have sophisticated technology in their rural homes.

SACSCOC Request for Additional Information #6: Learning resources at the Union campus are available to students at the site as well as all collections throughout the University of South Carolina System through interlibrary loan and the librarian at the Laurens Learning Resources Center assists students in accessing resources. Collections on site at the USC Union campus are supplemented by electronic books and audio-visual materials. Databases are available as well. While the prospectus notes that courses, not programs, are offered at the site, students can earn 50% or more of programs. Discipline-specific learning resources to support the courses offered at the site should be listed.

Laurens Campus Library Resources

Students at the Laurens site have access to all available learning resources through the PASCAL system and all USC system library resources. The library at the Laurens location of USC Union has three computers dedicated to accessing learning resources. The Laurens Center Director and Administrative Specialists have been trained by the USC Union Library Manager to assist students with the various processes for acquiring information. The assistant librarian from the Union campus goes over to the Laurens site on a regular basis.

There is a library of 925 books (Appendix F: Laurens site Catalog) on site that students may check out, and students may borrow books from the Union Library. Such materials are transported multiple times each week.

A reference question that cannot be answered at the Laurens campus may be submitted to the Union campus at 429-8728, ext. 7714 or 7716.

PASCAL provides access to the books of over 40 libraries in South Carolina. A student, staff member, or faculty member may borrow up to 25 books for a three-week period, with a two-week renewal period. PASCAL also provides access to databases. Students, staff, and faculty may also borrow from PASCAL. Books borrowed through PASCAL come to the Union campus library and are transported to the Laurens site. This usually takes about 4 days.

Inter-Library Loan — Books may be borrowed from any library in the continental United States. The book will be sent to the Union Library and transported to the Laurens location. The short-coming of ILL is that it is very slow. Books may take as long as a month to arrive. This service is valuable to faculty doing research for papers over a long period of time.

Databases --There are 92 databases available including those topics listed below. The databases are provided by the Columbia campus, by PASCAL and by the South Carolina State Library (DISCUS). There is no charge to the Laurens site. (Appendix G: Available Databases for LAURENS Site by Course/Discipline) links available databases for the Laurens site by course/discipline.

The Laurens site of USC Union is open 8:30 to 5:00 Monday through Friday. The Center Director has a strong student services background and helps students individually with advising and registration and other needs (Appendix B: Laurens Site Center Director CV). She regularly attends conferences in her field. The Center Director for the Laurens site is trained on how to access all of the student support services. The Laurens site has a local student handbook and student at the Laurens site also has access to the student affairs support of the Union and Columbia campuses. The enrollment manager handles the student activities and other student support services. Every year the Laurens site has faculty training.

The Union campus is a phone call away, and members of the Admissions, Registrar, and Financial Aid offices regularly go to the Laurens campus to assist. The local USC Union Student Handbook is available online as are all the Student Support Services of USC. Appropriate websites include:

The Center Director leads student activities at the site. SACSCOC Request for Additional Information #8: The Laurens location consists of 3,000 square feet of space to include three classrooms, offices, a lobby, a break room, and a library which is listed as having three computers for student use. **Please provide evidence of adequate physical resources to accommodate learning resource provision for students at the Laurens site.**

The USC Union Laurens site serves at most 40 to 50 students at the location at one time. Only 39 students are in classes in the facility simultaneously in fall 2014. Two classrooms are equipped for video streaming. One classroom that functions as a computer lab, currently has 13 computers with the capacity to have 17 computers. Most of the students attending this location have their own laptop computer.

The Laurens location meets the current needs of the students, faculty, and staff. The interior of the facility was designed and renovated in the fall of 2013 to accommodate 60 individuals. Additional space in the building can be used for expansion when and if the student population grows.

A reception area and lobby allow students to gather for informal conversations. The two part-time administrative specialists and student workers utilize this space and an adjacent office area for their work as receptionists and support staff.

The Center Director and an on-site faculty member have private offices. Two additional areas with desks and computers across from the library are available for adjunct faculty use. A kitchen/break room is located in the facility as well as handicap-accessible bathrooms.

The Laurens site is equipped with data and phone cabling which prove date and phone connection throughout the Laurens site. A metro-E circuit was also installed at the Laurens site and the circuit provides connectivity between Laurens and the Union locations. There are three Aruba AP 105 wireless access points installed in at the Laurens location. Since most of the students attending this location have their own laptop computer, the wireless access points provide students with access to wireless

internet at the Laurens site. An exhaustive list of computer, audio/visual equipment, and furnishing for the Laurens location can be found in (Appendix A: Laurens Site Information Technology Expenditures) is evidence that the Laurens site has adequate physical resources to accommodate learning resources provision for students at the site.

SACSCOC Request for Additional Information #9: One of the classrooms apparently contains fifteen desktops and serves as a computer lab but only when the classroom is not used for classes. Information concerning adequacy of financial support included reference to "upfitting costs" of the site including new table and chairs for classrooms and smart room equipment for one classroom as well as library shelving. Please provide evidence that physical facilities at the site are adequate to support the offerings at the site.

The USC Union Laurens site serves at most 40 to 50 students at the location at one time. All of the rooms have tables and chairs that can easily be moved around to accommodate the setup that is conducive for learning. An exhaustive list of equipment and furnishing for the Laurens location can be found in (Appendix A: Laurens Site Information Technology Expenditures).

In fall of 2014, the University conducted a student and a faculty survey regarding the adequacy of the physical facilities at the Laurens site.

The following is a summary of the feedback received from students attending the USC Union – Laurens site. A total of 13 students responded to the survey. Four students did not answer the item and questions on the back page of the survey. Student satisfaction with classroom setup, chairs/desks/tables, restroom facilities, and classroom technology were all 90% and above. Student satisfaction with all physical facilities surveyed was above 78%.

Beginning with the first summer session of 1970 and ending with May 11, 1979, the grade-point ratio of students entering college for the first time was determined as follows: Students entering during the summer sessions or fall semester had only those courses passed for credit during the summer session and/or the following fall semester counted toward their grade-point ratio students entering the spring semester had only those courses passed for credit during the spring semester and/or the following summer sessions counted toward their grade-point ratio. This policy did not apply to transfer students.

Only grades of A, B and C are considered to be passing grades on graduate courses. For degree purposes, graduate credit will be awarded for each hour graded C only if there is a corresponding hour of work graded A. Grades on graduate level thesis and dissertation research are on a Pass-Fail basis.

Credit (CR) indicates credit hours earned with at least the letter grade C.

Pass (P) indicates courses taken under the pass-fail grading system initiated August 1970. A grade of "P-Pass" is equivalent to at least the letter grade C. The grades P and F received on courses taken Pass-Fail (P/F) do not enter into the determination of a student's grade-point ratio.

Incomplete (I) indicates that a relatively small part of the semester's work remains undone. Students are allowed thirty days after the beginning of the next scheduled session, excluding summers and regardless of the student's enrollment status, to make up the incomplete grade.

Withdrew (W) indicates that the student withdrew from the course after the first four weeks of classwork and prior to the last five weeks of classes in the fall and spring semesters. A proportionate time period is used for summer sessions. Beginning Fall 1982, students may receive only a limited number of W grades. Exceeding the limit may affect the student's grade-point ratio.

A student may repeat a course he has passed with a grade lower than B. The credit hours <u>earned</u> for the second time will be deducted, but both grades received will be computed in the grade-point ratio.

Effective Summer School 1988, all course/grade discrepancies must be resolved within 120 calendar days from the date printed on the appropriate grade report.

Normally, Junior Division Honors is awarded following the completion of the student's sophomore year.




