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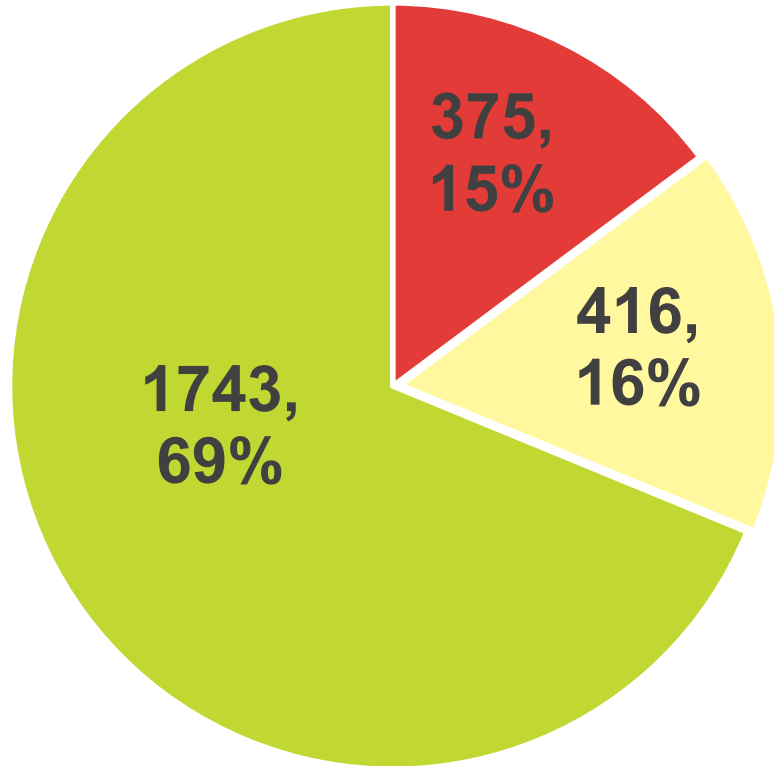
# EXCEPTIONS DEFINED

- **Exception:** Student is admitted despite not fully meeting one or more standard requirements. (e.g., GPA, test scores, prerequisites, etc.)
- Departments submit the **Program Recommendation** to the Graduate School. There are 2 people in the Graduate School who review if it includes an exception. Graduate School staff process the **Admission Decision**.
- **Admission is based on a holistic review** that considers other strengths, such as experience, recommendations, or academic potential.
- Students admitted with exceptions **may need to meet conditions after enrolling**, like maintaining a certain GPA or completing specific courses.



# PURPOSE

- Many “admit with exceptions” cases are being submitted
- The project analyzes exception patterns and justifications
- Insights will find ways to better guide departments to improve application requirements
- Goal: reduce exceptions, improve efficiency, and speed up admissions processing

# PROJECT PATH

## Gathered input from:

**Graduate Directors and Deans** and on what standards can be used, what types of material is needed for application review, if application minimums can be updated in the Bulletin

**Graduate School staff** to gain perspective on how exception review can be streamlined

**Analyzed exceptions** submitted for the 24/25 academic year to determine what types of exceptions are submitted

**Determined categories** of exceptions currently being submitted

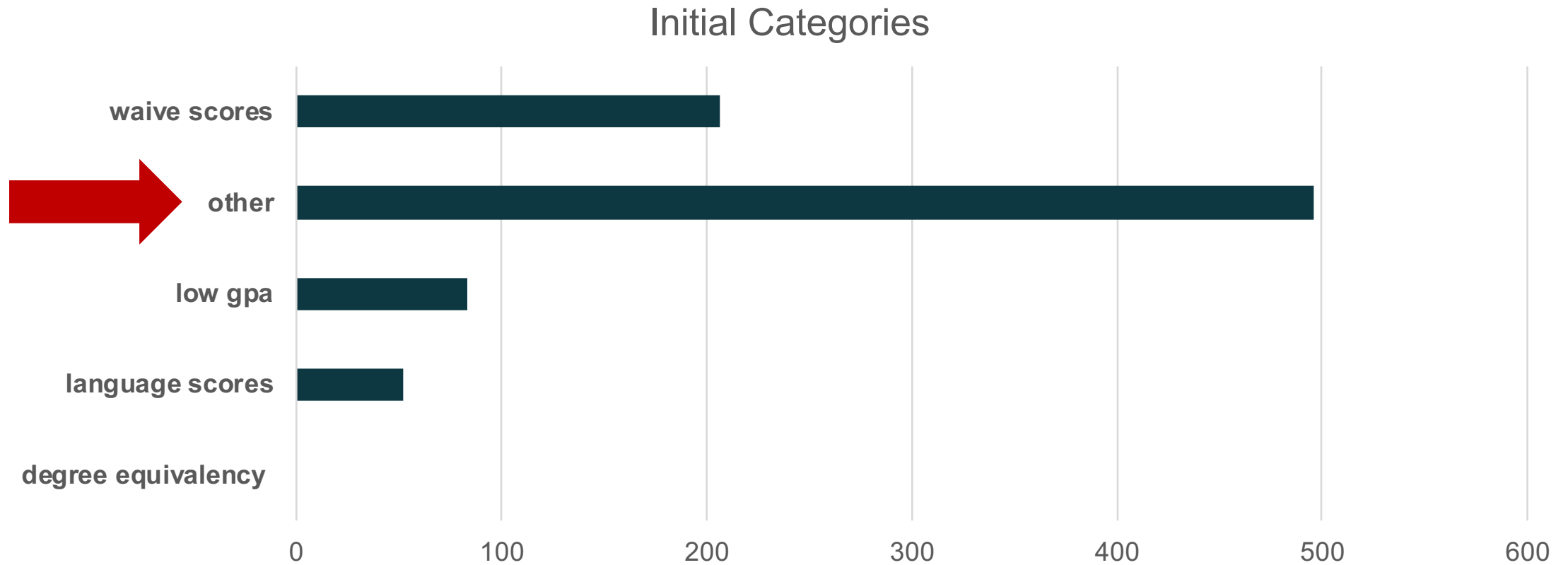


# KEY IMPROVEMENTS

- **Updates to ADMIT** to include categories of exceptions
  - Will clarify departments' intentions when they submit AAR with exceptions – and minimize the time for Graduate School staff to review exceptions submitted
- **Ability to easily create reports** to show exception volume by categories including:
  - College or department
  - Type of exception
- **Next-round improvement actions:**
  - Drill down further on what “minimums” are acceptable
  - Determine when exceptions should have clear, specific conditions for admitted students to complete within their first term

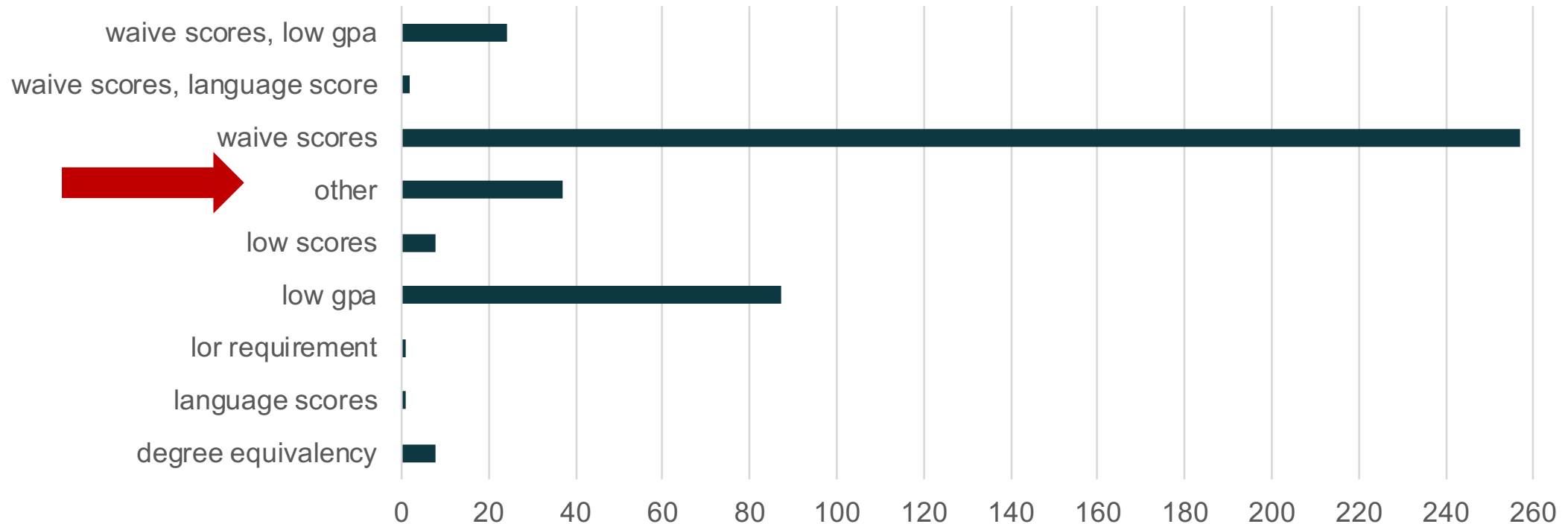


# EXCEPTION CATEGORIES – BEFORE



# EXCEPTION CATEGORIES – AFTER

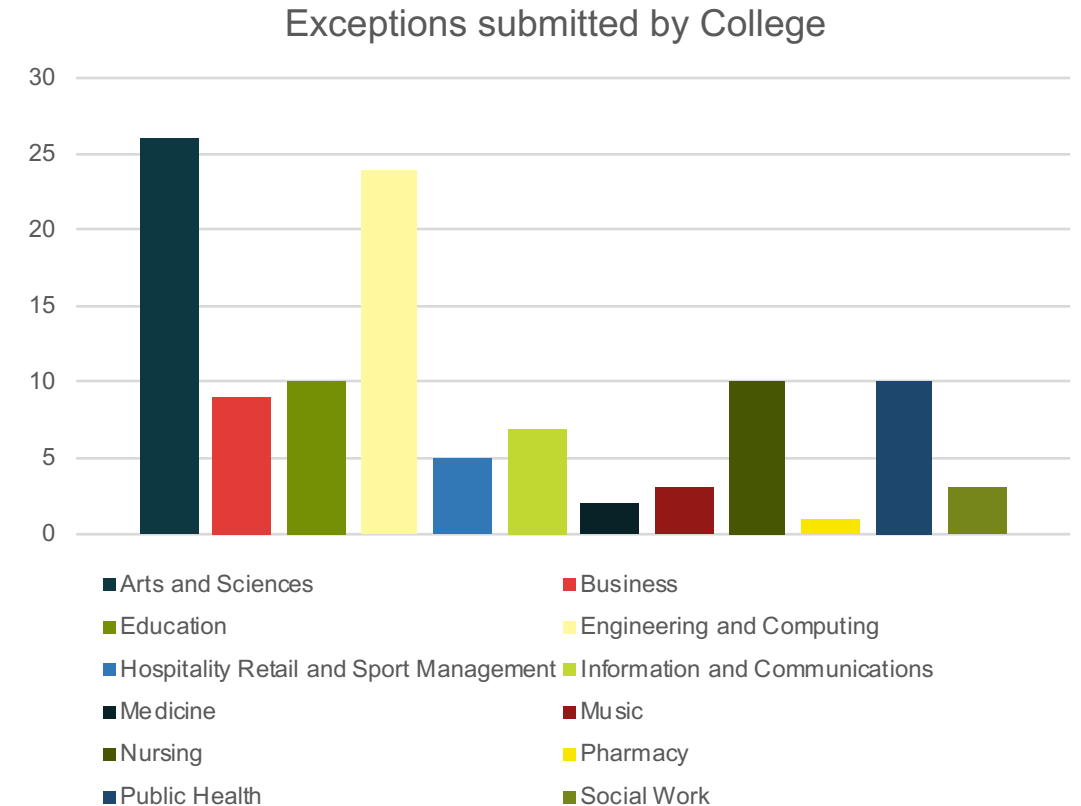
Count by Category





# NEXT STEPS

- Present data to departments to determine what requirements can be updated in the Bulletin – to be more transparent for applicants
- Better define certain categories to sharpen analysis – and spot possible improvement opportunities
- Identify actions to make exception review more consistent
- Standardize the justification that is needed for exceptions – and the conditions that are warranted to ensure success in the student's first semester



# EXPECTED RESULTS

- **Increased transparency** – encourages departments to update application requirements in the Bulletin
- **Reduced processing time** – categorizing the exception type will benefit Graduate Directors as well as Graduate School staff reviewing AARs
- **Standardized terminology** – allows for better data analysis and increases consistency



# REFLECTIONS

**Improvement is not linear!** We knew there was a need to analyze the exception process, but the “how” was not as clear.

**This is not the end.** There are many actions that can be worked on going forward to continue to streamline this part of the admissions cycle.

**It takes buy-in from people across campus.** The result will be a better experience when applying to Graduate School at USC.
